About Eye See...Eye Learn®



The Eye See...Eye Learn® program is dedicated to making sure that parents across Ontario understand the importance of regular comprehensive eye exams for children. It is important to note that vision screenings and sight tests that are sometimes done at a child's school are not the same as a **comprehensive eye exam**.

How it works

The program encourages parents to book a comprehensive eye exam for their junior kindergarten child (born in 2013) with a local, participating optometrist. The eye exam is covered by OHIP. All children are entitled to yearly OHIP-covered eye exams until they turn 20. If a child needs glasses, they will receive a **complimentary** pair donated by Nikon Lenswear, OGI and the participating optometrist. The estimated value of the glasses is over \$250.

Only children born in 2013 can participate in the program until June 30, 2018. Children born in 2014 will be eligible as of July 1, 2018

To participate, find a participating optometrist near you and let them know you are booking an Eye See...Eye Learn eye exam. When searching for an optometrist, please note that participating optometrists will have Eye See..Eye Learn doctor beside their name. www.optom.on.ca

Why junior kindergarten children?

The Eye See...Eye Learn® program was developed to teach parents the importance of having their children's eyes checked before starting school.

Each year, thousands of children start school without ever having an eye exam, even though 80 per cent of learning comes directly through vision. In fact, children who cannot see the board, focus on a picture or follow words in a book may struggle to achieve their full learning potential. Sadly, one in four school-aged children has an undetected vision problem that is affecting their learning.

Vision problems can also impact a child's social development and hand-eye coordination for physical activities. That is why the Ontario Association of Optometrists (OAO) recommends comprehensive eye examinations for children entering junior kindergarten. There is an important link between eye health and education, and the Eye See...Eye Learn® program helps ensure junior kindergarten students get the best start to learning.

Does my child need an eye exam?

Each year, thousands of children start school without ever having an eye exam. Parent often believe that their child will let them know that they cannot see well, but children are rarely able to tell that they have poor vision because they have nothing to compare it to. That's why we recommend that all children have their first eye exam at 6 months old, again at 2-3 years old, and every year after that. People 65 years and older and those younger than 20, are covered by OHIP for a routine eye examination provided by either an optometrist or physician once every 12 months plus any follow-up assessments that may be required. The Learning Curve by Kyleen Gray

What's Inquiry Based Learning?

Like all professions, teaching has its trends: differentiated instruction, 21st century classroom, streaming then de-streaming, etc. The current 'hot' teaching trend finding its way into many classrooms across Ontario is **Inquiry Based Learning**. IBL (for short) is essentially a method of learning that is student centered. Teachers guide students through the process of questioning, researching, analyzing, interpreting, creating, sharing and re-thinking. This type of learning is often project based or focuses on an overreaching question that dominates a particular unit of study.

At first glance, teachers, students and parents may be wary of IBL as it seem to lack structure and specific learning outcomes, but in reality that is its' strength. Inquiry Based Learning doesn't limit students interests, learning capacities or styles to a dictated methodology. It allows them to explore learning about a question, curiosity or topic at their own pace, in their own way with their teacher as their guide, mentor and sounding board.

Your child may already be taking part in IBL projects in their classroom, as the method of teaching has many pseudonyms: passion projects, genius hour, questioning, project based learning, etc.

If you are interested in how to support them in their learning, ask their classroom teacher for the strategies they are using to guide students so that you can mimic them at home. But whatever you do: don't influence or dictate what they should be learning and how they should go about doing it! It's tough to take the roll of the observer and guide, but that is the key to successful Inquiry Based Learning.

If you are interested in learning more about Inquiry Based Learning, there are oodles of resources online and via the Ontario Ministry of Education. Just Google it!



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

THE SPRING BEAR HUNT by Sean 'Blue' Grav

Although it seems as though winter isn't going to end and the snow will never melt, inevitably it will. We will then have a short time to enjoy the last few weeks before the annoying black flies and mosquitoes begin. Most of us get very excited for summer and forget to enjoy the spring weather. My favorite activity in the spring is the black bear hunt.

After a 15-year closure, many avid hunters had to find other activities in the spring that didn't include hunting, but now that the hunt is back, we have a big game season again. The spring bear hunt has plated many of tasty meals in my household so I will give you a few hints on how to get started.

Many hunters believe the spring bear hunt to be easy, especially if the hunter is using bait. However, black bears are extremely smart and have a keen sense of smell and hearing which can make a hunt very difficult depending on spring food sources. Here are 10 quick tips that can help make a spring bear hunt successful if you are baiting.

- Find a stand location with good cover and close to water (bears need water and feel comfortable in good cover such as pines).
- Bears usually approach baits at dawn and dusk, but all day sits can prove successful especially if more that one bear is on the bait site.
- Be sure you are about 40yrds away from the bait to avoid being noticed.
- Most bears prefer sweets over meats. However, a separate stink bait of rotting meat/fish is a sure way to get a bears attention.
- Always be sure you are down wind from the bait or you will be sitting for nothing. A bear will smell you from kilometers away.
- Try to remain motionless. Although bears do not have excellent site, they can spot sudden movements.
- Be sure you have a clear lane for a clean kill shot as bears are super powerful animals and can travel long distances if a shot is not great.
- After your shot always wait 20 minutes or so which will prevent the animal from moving.
- As it is a spring hunt, ALWAYS wear a mosquito net and ALWAYS use a Thermacell. If you do not have a Thermacell, get one as they will keep the bugs at bay. Never use fly repellant.
- Be sure to have a pack-sack with all of your supplies such as knives, gloves, rope, flashlights etc. Many times you will have to track in the dark so a good light is a must.

Spring bear hunting can be frustrating, but these simple tips will certainly give you a chance. Good luck and have fun!!

Test Your Smoke Alarms




Clean Your Windows


Feed The Birds

Do you KNIT or CROCHET??

Every new patient receiving chemotherapy treatment at the Northeast Cancer Centre receives a present ~ a beautiful afghan or quilt hand-made by a volunteer. The blankets keep the patients warm during their treatments ~ the drugs feel cold as they're going through their system, and the chemotherapy room itself can be a little chilly at times. **Unfortunately,** the cupboard at the Northern Cancer Foundation where the blankets are kept is currently a bit bare.

That's why Northern Cancer Foundation volunteer adviser Angela Corsi-Raso, who co-ordinates the blanket donation program, is putting a call-out to the community. She's asking for people to knit or crochet afghans with a minimum size of 40 inches by 56 inches (enough to cover an adult from shoulders to toes). Be sure to pay attention to this requirement, as smaller blankets aren't useable.

They can also knit eight-inch squares that are later sewn into blankets — it takes about 35 of these squares to make a blanket.

Donations can be dropped off in the Northern Cancer Foundation office, which is located near the welcome desk at the cancer centre.



LEONA DAWE

Townsfolk describe her as: **talented, inspirational, helpful, wonderful, spirited, regal, beautiful inside and out.** She is a teacher, an angel and our Princess! Few people invoke such warm thoughts from others. Indeed we in Onaping Falls are blessed to have had such a generous individual in our midst for the past 65 years.

You may know Leona from one of her many athletic pursuits: In the summer you will find her on the links of the Windy Lake Golf Course, in the winter she swims at the local pool. Perhaps you were lucky enough to be taught by her how to use a serger, sew, crotchet or knit! She has generously shared her gifted craftsmanship with the community for over 47years.

Leona also taught in Dowling, Chelmsford and Sudbury.

I recently joined Leona's sewing class, over the sewing machine she shared a number of her memories with me. Leona's earliest years were spent in Sudbury. Her mom Saimi, father Len, and brother Bobby lived in a variety of neighbourhoods through out the city. She remembers living on Frood Rd. while her father went and fought in WW2 and how her mother worked as a seamstress during this time. Leona remembers how her mom "kept everything going" during this time period. While we often recognize the bravery and sacrifice of those who went and fought in wars, the

sacrifices made by family members of those who served are usually overlooked. Leona's family moved to Onaping in 1953 they were one of the first 9 pioneering families. While Leona stayed in Sudbury to finish her schooling, one weekend she decided to come out and visit. Without any phones or regular transportation Leona was dropped off at the Hardy Mine Site close to midnight, she recalls carrying her suitcase up to the house on Campbell Street to the sounds of wolves howling. How surprised her mother was to answer the door to Leona in the middle of the night. Leona was hired by Falconbridge Nickel Mines after finishing school, she worked in the townsite office which was located in the apartment building on Service Road, until the building was finished beside the Mine Rescue station. Here Leona proved to be an expert typer in short order.



She married Norm Dawe in 1958. Most people know Norm as a fixture in the Levack arena, cheering their son Robert as he led his teams to many victories throughout the years. Both Leona and Norm continue to cheer on local youngsters in Hockey and Figure skating.

While Leona was born with a natural talent, she took many courses to hone and develop it.

She continues to quote and give credit to her teachers today with the wisdom they bestowed upon her: Mrs. Marttila, Mrs. Pinder, and Madame Dibelo from Montreal. In 1970 Leona started sewing classes in her basement until Mr. Gibb encouraged her to offer night classes at the High School. Incredibly enough, two of her first students continue under her tutelage 47years later! They have been with her through the years making, fur coats to lingerie, denim vests to duffle coats. (Hudson's Bay coats)

In the few short lessons I have had with Leona, I could add another long list of adjectives to describe her.

Smart, fearless, patient, she tackled my new computerized machine without batting an eye.

Encouraging me to "just try it - see what happens".

Many lessons that I will take with me to my own students!

What is the secret to Leona's success?

"I enjoy what I do, to me it is not a job, it is a pleasure" I think it is fitting that Leona's birthday is 'the real first day of spring is her birthday ~ March 21.'

There is a **Finnish word SISU** which translated means: determination, strength, perseverance and resilience.

Leona not only inherited her mother's creative skills but also her **SISU! Just think if all community members were** ½ **as giving as Leona!**What a difference it would make!
