





The Learning Curve by Kyleen Gray

Report Card Conversations

This week, most elementary students received their term 1 report cards. For some, this time of year is a celebration; for others, it holds disappointment and frustration.

Regardless of the outcome of your child's report card, you should take time to discuss it with them, and make a game plan for term 2. Here are some tips for talking to your child about their report card:

- Allow your child to read their report card; if they can't read yet, read it for them (paraphrasing to support understanding as required).
- Start the conversation on a positive note, by asking them to point out something on the report card that they are proud of.
- Then, tell them something on the report card that you are proud of.
- Next, ask them to identify 1-3 skills or behaviours that they would like to improve on; they may need help refining specific skills/behaviours.
- Talk about how you both will know that they are improving on their chosen skills or behaviours as the term progresses; you could even
 come up with some kind of tracking system to gauge improvement.

You may also want to have a meeting with your child's teacher about the report card, especially if you don't feel like it reflects your child's capabilities or work submissions. Here are some tips for parent-teacher conversations about mid-term report cards:

- •Schedule a meeting with the teacher.
- •Before the meeting, make jot notes or highlight parts of the report card that you'd like to discuss. Try to focus on 1-3 key items.
- •If you are curious about grading, you can ask to see the teacher's grade book, as well as grading tools (rubrics, checklists, etc) and examples of your child's graded work.
- •Create an action plan with the teacher to address the concerns you've discussed with them. Ensure that you have established good communication methods to carry out this action plan .

Report card time should be an opportunity for growth. Encourage your child to view it from this perspective, by focusing on goals for improvement. A positive parent-teacher relationship should also support your child in setting and tracking realistic, achievable gains as the term progresses. Positive conversations about report cards are key to supporting your child in their educational journey.





The Royal York Trout/Salmon Recipe by Sean Gray

As we reach the mid-way point of ice fishing season, I am sure that anglers have been catching and cooking fish; if they are anything like me, they are always trying different recipes.

Depending on what kind of fish you are cooking, it will influence how you cook it. Since we live in Northern Ontario and have good access to a variety of trout, I would like to share a trout recipe that I came across a few years back. This recipe has been my go to as it is easy, super fast, and it tastes delicious.

About 15 years ago I was visiting a camp in Manitowaning Bay and I happened to meet a chef who used to cook at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto. We were fishing for rainbow trout. After being very successful, he cooked up a delicious meal using the recipe he had used at the hotel and it was amazing. Since then, I have used it several times and it has never failed me. Most everyone I cook for comes around for seconds and YES thirds.

Here it is:

Any size trout fillets de-boned with skin on Fresh or dried dill

Paprika

Montreal Steak Spice (optional)

Salt to taste

Pepper

Olive Oil

Fresh Lemon

Garlic powder

Instructions:

Pre heat oven to about 370 degrees or light the BBQ on medium. Lay out the fillets skin side down. Rub a generous layer of olive oil over each fillet, then cover the fillet with paprika until you cannot see the flesh of the fish. Next, sprinkle the fillets with salt, pepper, Montreal Steak Spice and garlic, and cover with fresh dill. If you use dry dill, use LOTS. You may want to cut the fillets into thirds depending on the size of the fish. Place the fish on the grill or the oven rack skin down and bake for about 20 minutes in the oven or 15 minutes on the grill. If you use the grill you can flip for the last couple minutes. Enjoy!! I prefer the grill!



Spring Clean Your Freezer






